As I've shared in previous newsletters, I have been around older adults as long as I can remember. I visited a family member in a nursing home as a young girl, and have worked and volunteered in various skilled nursing facilities, adult day programs, assisted living facilities, community based programs, and home care agencies. After working for the Peabody Council on Aging for a number of years I went back to graduate school at the University of Massachusetts Boston. The program, Gerontology and Management of Aging Services, was new at the time, and drew in people with a variety of backgrounds. Many of my classmates were looking for a career change and came from many different fields such as banking, manufacturing, publishing, and more. There were a few of us already working in the field, and I believe that we were at a significant advantage when it came to the overview of Elder Services. I can clearly remember sitting in that classroom talking about the various agencies, services, and terms—who provides what, where the funding comes from, and how they all intersect. As I had already been working in the field, much of this I already knew. My classmates from other fields however, had an extremely difficult time. Attempting to make some sort of organizational chart was an impossible endeavor, and I'm fairly certain we lost a few students after that class! This is one lesson that has always stuck with me. If it was this difficult for us, as professionals in the field to figure out elder services, how could someone who looking for help for a loved one figure it? It is HARD to figure out what resources are out there. It is HARD to understand what you should or should not be doing. And it is HARD to ask for help, or even know where to go for help!

With Medicare's Open Enrollment starting this month, things get even more confusing! I am the SHINE Counselor for Essex, and am available to help you or a loved one navigate the world of Medicare. I do strongly encourage everyone to review his or her Supplemental and Part D plans every fall. This year is no exception. Unfortunately, specific information about changes and plans for 2020 is not made available to SHINE Counselors under just before Open Enrollment begins. In November and December's Newsletters, you can expect to updated information about these changes. Instead, this month we felt it would be beneficial to provide a glossary of terms used in senior services. This list can be found on page 4.

In addition to the start of Open Enrollment, there are a few other interesting things coming up in October. First, it's Fire Safety Month! This is the time to test your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Since it is also "Organize your Medical Information Month", it's also a great time to update your "File of Life". (Yes, this really is a thing!) We have insert cards at the center, and will have additional red magnets available at the end of the month.

Competitive Energy Suppliers

Earlier this summer, the Massachusetts Attorney General's Office was here to discuss the Energy Suppliers Market. This was a great presentation and we want to pass along some key and useful information.

What is a Competitive Supplier?

A competitive supplier is not your utility. A competitive supplier is a company licensed by the Dept. of Public Utilities to purchase electricity and related services from the wholesale electricity markets for resale to retail customers. Typically a residential customer who buys electricity from a competitive supplier will see the charge as a line item on the customer's electric utility bill.

What are my electric supply options?

- 1) Basic service with your electric company. Basic Service is competitively procured every 6 months by your electric company for all their residential customers. This is the default options and generally the most affordable.
- 2) Competitive supplier.

Why switch to a supplier?

The AGO reports that customers have been enticed with promises of savings, however, an AGO study found that those who switched wound up paying more. In MA along from July 2015 to June 2017, residential customers on competitive supply products suffered NET LOSSES of \$176.8 Million.

Attorney General's Tips for Consumers.

- 1) Beware of Utility Impersonators. Your utility will never go door to door or call asking to see your bill or your account number.
- 2) Treat your utility account number as you would your credit card. Don't share this number with strangers or sales agents unless you want to sign up for competitive electric supply. If you give your number to an unscrupulous agent, the agent can sign you up without your knowledge.
- 3) Your basic service supply rate is competitively procured for you by your electric company **every 6 months**. Basic service rates are usually higher in the winter and lower in the summer.
- 4) You are signing a contract when you switch to competitive supply. Know your rights and ask questions:
 - * How long is this contract?
- * Is my rate fixed or variable?
- * Does this contract auto-renew?
- * Is there a cancellation fee?
- * Are you saving me money for the entire length of the contract?
- 5) If you change your mind after switching to a competitive supply, you have THREE BUSINESS DAYS to cancel.
- 6) Your utility offers a number of flexible billing options, including budget billing, monthly variable rates, fixed rates, and options for low income customers. Contact National Grid for more information. 1-800-456-1212

Social Services



Health and Continuum of Care Glossary

Council on Aging: (COA) A municipal agency that provides local outreach, social and health services, advocacy, information and referral for older adults, families, and caregivers. Friends of the Council on Aging: A non-profit organization that fundraises to support the Essex COA, and sponsors numerous events.

Essex Senior Club: A private, membership organization for older adults in Essex with regular meetings and activities. Aging Service Access Point: (ASAPS) The 27 ASAPS in Mass. are private, non-profit state-designated agencies that work to provide a variety of programs and services. They provide direct services, such as In-home Care, Information and Referral, Case Management, Protective Services, Caregiver Support, and other programs that serve older adults.

Area Agency on Aging: (AAA) Established by federal Older Americans Act. These 23 agencies provide programs to help older adults stay in their homes. Most AAAs are also ASAPs. Senior Care Inc is also the designated AAA for Essex.

Executive Office of Elder Affairs: (EOEA) Lead state-wide agency on aging and elder care issues. Among services offered is the Home Care Program, Family Caregiver Support Program, toll-free helpline (800-AGE-INFO) and informative website. Senior Care: Essex's ASAP and AAA, which provide services such as Meals on Wheels, Money Management, Case Management, Volunteer Services, Transportation, and more.

Housing

Elderly Housing: provides housing for income qualified elderly, and non-elderly disabled individuals.

Assisted Living Facility: Combines housing and supportive services, including assistance with ADLs. Participants do not require 24/7 nursing care.

Continuing Care Retirement Community: Residential community designed to meet needs of elders. There is often a full continuum of care—independent living, assisted living, and Skilled Nursing Facility usually on one campus.

Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF): Also called nursing home, provides 24/7 nursing care.

Adult Foster Care: State-funded program that allows qualified seniors and individuals with disabilities to remain in the community with a qualified and approved caregiver.

Health Insurance

SHINE (Serving the Health Insurance Needs of Elders)

Offers Medicare beneficiaries free and unbiased health insurance counseling from trained volunteers.

Medicare: Federal health insurance for individuals over 65, or those who have been disabled for 24 months or longer.

Part A: Hospital Coverage under Medicare. It also includes Short Term Skilled Nursing Facility, Medical Equipment, and some Home Health Services.

Part B: Medical Coverage under Medicare for physician services, medical equipment, tests, therapies, etc.

Part D: Drug Coverage under Medicare. Plans are overseen by Medicare, but run by private insurers.

Medicare Advantage Plan (Part C): Managed Care plan overseen by Medicare but offered by Private Companies. Plans typically have a lower Month premium than a Medigap.

Medigap: These types of plans work with Medicare and cover various 'gaps' in Medicare.

Medicaid: (MassHealth) A variety of Health insurance programs provided through a state and federal partnership to provide care for individuals meeting income and asset limits.

Prescription Advantage: State insurance program that can decrease prescription costs, and can provide the option to change part D plans during the calendar year.

Deductible: The amount of money you will pay BEFORE your insurance company will pay a claim.

Copayment: A fixed amount you will pay for health services in addition to what your insurer pays.

Coinsurance: The percentage of costs you will pay for covered health care services (prescriptions or medical services) after you've paid your deductible.

Formulary: The list of prescriptions covered by an insurer. **Extra Help:** A Medicare program that helps people with limited income and resources pay for prescriptions.

Open Enrollment Period: (Oct 7—Dec 15) Annual period where Medicare Beneficiaries can make changes to their Part D Plan, and Medicare Advantage Plans.

General Enrollment Period: (Jan 1—Mar 31) Annual period in which individuals who declined Medicare Parts A and/or B can enroll. Coverage Begins July 1.

Benefits and Services:

Activities of Daily Living: Bathing, Dressing and Grooming, Walking and moving about, eating, toileting, and other personal care tasks.

Adult Day Health Program (ADH); A community based health program that provides social and medical support for elders and adults with disabilities. Care includes case management, registered nursing care, family support, activities, and 2 meals each day.

Hospice: A special way of caring for terminally ill people. Hospice care involves a team-oriented approach that addresses the medical, physical, social, emotional, and spiritual needs of the patient. It also provides support to the family or caregivers. **Visiting Nurse (VNA)** Nurses/specialists who provide skilled nursing and therapy services in someone's home.

Program for All Inclusive Care of the Elderly: (PACE) A model of managed care for very frail elders who are nursing home eligible but receive services in the community.

Respite Care: Short term care of an older or disabled adult in a nursing facility to enable relatives or caregivers to take some time off from caregiving responsibilities.

Home and Community Based Waiver (Frail Elder Waiver) MassHealth Program that allows nursing home eligible seniors and disabled adults to stay in the community with expanded inhome services.

NEW SCAM ALERT!

Over the past few years, DNA tests have become popular across the country. Unfortunately unscrupulous people are taking advantage of the buzz around these tests to scam Medicare beneficiaries.

Scammers will often target Medicare beneficiaries through telemarketing calls, booths at public events, health fairs, and door-to-door visits. They offer "free" genetic testing to help recipients avoid diseases or find the right medications. The scammers claim that the testing is covered by Medicare, and therefore is free to the beneficiary. Either you end up with a bill for up to \$10,000, or they fraudulently bill Medicare for services not rendered, which costs us all! The Administration for Community Living (ACL) offers this advice to avoid being scammed:

- Do not accept genetic testing services, including a cheek swab, from someone at a community event, a local fair, a farmer's market, a parking lot, or any other large event.
- Always be cautious about giving out your personal information, including your Medicare number.
- If you receive a genetic testing kit in the mail, don't accept it unless it was ordered by your physician. Refuse the delivery or return it to the sender and keep a record of the sender's name and the date you returned the items.
- Always review your Medicare Summary Notice or Explanation of Benefits. The words "gene analysis" or "molecular pathology" may indicate questionable genetic testing.

Time for Medicare Plan Review with SHINE

It's that time of year again! If you are enrolled in a Medicare Prescription Drug Plan or a Medicare Advantage Plan (HMO/PPO), you should receive an information packet from your current plan by the end of September. It is important to review and understand this information because it explains the changes in your plan for 2020. Even though you may have the best plan for you this year, it's important to review all of your options for 2020 because plans, premiums, deductibles, co-pays, and the drugs covered by your plan can change significantly year to year! Some years we have big changes, and some years we don't. I expect that we will see a good number of changes as we head into 2020.

A SHINE Counselor can help you review plan options and find the best option for your individual health needs. Kristin is the SHINE Counselor for Essex. She has been providing this service to numerous communities since 2003!
